

Overview

Your agency's participation in *Week of the Young Child* is critical in helping individuals throughout Alabama recognize the needs of young children, and helping thank the caregivers and other adults involved in building better futures for all children. Federal, state, and local government, communities, parents and businesses all have a role in building better futures for all children and *Week of the Young Child* is the time to help recognize this. This toolkit provides step-by-step ideas and fill-in-the-blank tools to make your participation SIMPLE.

What is *Week of the Young Child*?

Week of the Young Child is an annual celebration sponsored by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), the world's largest early childhood education association, with nearly 60,000 members and a national network of over 300 local, state, and regional Affiliates.

The purpose of *Week of the Young Child* is to focus public attention on the needs of young children and their families and to recognize the early childhood programs and services that meet those needs.

NAEYC first established *Week of the Young Child* in 1971, recognizing that the early childhood years (birth through age 8) lay the foundation for children's success in school and later life. The *Week of the Young Child* is a time to plan how we – as citizens of a community, of a state, and of a nation – will better meet the needs of all young children and their families.

What is Being Done in Alabama to Celebrate *Week of the Young Child*?

This year due to COVID-19, the Alabama Partnership for Children will NOT be coordinating the annual *Joining Hands for Week of the Young Child* or *Strolling Thunder* events. Instead we encourage you to pick one day during the week and conduct your own stroll with your children. Why Focus on Young Children and Early Childhood Programs?

We know today more than ever that children's earliest years are crucial learning years, and those years lay the foundation for children's success in school and beyond. The *Week of the Young Child* is a time to recognize the needs of young children, and to recommit ourselves to ensuring that each and every child experiences the type of early learning environment – at home, at child care, and in the community – that will build better futures for all children.

Who Can Participate?

Week of the Young Child participation is open to anyone with an interest in recognizing the needs of young children, and/or thanking the caregivers and other adults involved in building better futures for all children. Anyone can lead a celebration and it is a wonderful opportunity to partner with other groups in conducting community-wide celebrations and to rally more people to speak out about the issues. By joining together, you can make the *Week of the Young Child* a huge success – in your community and around Alabama!

Remember – Collaboration Works!

Your leadership in support of Alabama's *Week of the Young Child* celebration is extremely important, but keep in mind that there are others in your community who can help. Board members, agency staff, partnering organizations, and others should be invited and encouraged to provide assistance, particularly in the areas of media relations and advocacy on behalf of young children. Collaboration helps when it comes to building a strong team and achieving the best results for *Week of the Young Child*.

Music Monday: April 3, 2023

Sing, dance, celebrate, and learn

Through music, children develop math, language, and literacy skills all while having fun and being active!

Try this: Find the beat to connect music, movement, and math. Practice clapping, drumming, or stomping to the beat of the music while counting.

Tasty Tuesday: April 4, 2023

Healthy eating and fitness at home and school

Cooking together connects math with literacy skills, science, and more! With the rise in childhood obesity, you can encourage healthy nutrition at home and in the classroom by creating your own healthy tacos.

Try this: Measure your ingredient while making your tacos! Ask children if they would like the same or different amounts of each ingredient.

Work Together Wednesday: April 5, 2023

Work together, build together, learn together

When children build together they explore math and science concepts and develop their social and early literacy skills. Children can use any building material from forming a fort of branches outside to building a city out of blocks in the classroom.

Try this: Practice organizing blocks by size! Try building a block tower with large blocks on the bottom and little blocks on top.

Artsy Thursday: April 6, 2023

Think, problem solve, create

Children develop creativity, social skills, and fine motor skills with open-ended art projects where they can make choices, use their imaginations, and create with their hands. Use any material (crayons, paint, or clay) to celebrate the joy and learning children experience when engaged in creative art making.

Try this: Bring art outdoors! Offer dark and light paper, chalk and pastels, and suggest children create their own versions of the day and night sky.

Family Friday: April 7, 2023

Sharing family stories

Engaging and celebrating families is at the heart of supporting our youngest learners.

Try this: Invite parents for a Family Friendly breakfast, where children can prepare and share breakfast treats with their family.

Social Media Guide

Social media is a powerful tool you can use to raise awareness about the *Week of the Young Child* (WOYC) by incorporating the hashtag #WOYC21 in your posts. Here are some ideas you can use for your organizational or personal social networking sites.

- Like the Alabama Partnership for Children and NAEYC on Facebook. Both pages will be posting periodic messages in the coming months about WOYC that you can share with your fans and friends!

Dear Editor,

There are over 500,000 children from birth to age eight in Alabama (or change to represent your community). These early years are a crucial stage for development – a time when young children should receive high quality early learning experiences, which lay the foundation for success in school and beyond.

April 1-7, 2023, is *Week of the Young Child*, a time when the name of agency/organization, along with the Alabama Partnership for Children and other state and national advocates and organizations, will join together to recognize the needs of young children, and thank the caregivers and other adults involved in their quality early learning experiences. Parents, caregivers, teachers, and other adults play very important roles in the lives of young children, and we will celebrate their efforts during *Week of the Young Child*.

For many young children, an important part of the early learning years are spent in child care, preschool and other early education programs. These programs are a crucial step in the education and development of our young children, yet the 2008 Alabama Childcare Workforce Study indicates that we still pay the early childhood teachers in these programs less than hairstylists and garbage collectors.

Week of the Young Child is a good time to recognize something we should remember all year: If we want our children to have the opportunity to succeed in school and life, we need to support the families, teachers and programs that give them a great start on learning.
